

Four Seasons Garden: This lawn and courtyard is a great place to sit, look over pack materials, write in journals, or explore. This garden is beautiful year-round and has plants of different textures, shapes, and colors. Find a plant. What parts of the plant are showing? Would this plant look the same in a different season? Herb Garden: This garden is full of plants used to flavor foods and beverages and includes edible flowers and dyes! What is your favorite meal? Does it have plants in it? Why do some plants taste good?	Rose Garden: In the summer, there are over 900 flowering roses! You might see some rosehips, the oval-shape fruit of the rose which holds seeds inside. Try smelling some of the roses. Which smells the strongest? Which do you like the best? Can you find any rosehips? Water Pavilion: Our pond is fed by water from the Red Butte Creek and holds cutthroat trout. Many animals like ducks, racoons, and mink have been spotted in this part of the garden! Take a seat inside the Water Pavilion. What sounds do you hear? How do the plants along the pond look different than plants in other parts of the garden?
Medicinal Garden: This area has plants that have been used in medicine by cultures throughout history and today! There's a Sycamore tree growing in the center of the garden because according to legend, Hippocrates taught his students medicine under one on the Greek island of Kos. Check out the signs around the Medicinal Garden to learn about plants!	Six Bridges Trail: Enjoy the sights and sounds of Red Butte Creek. Meander on bridges on this accessible trail. Red Butte Creek starts high in the Wasatch Mountains and flows down through Liberty Park, to the Jordan River, and into the Great Salt Lake. How many different sounds can you hear? How many different colors can you find?
Fragrance Garden: This garden has amazing smells all year and at different times of the day and night! Which flower smells the strongest? Which smells the least? Many pollinators especially love this part of the garden. Can you spot any in the area? What are they doing?	Oak Tunnel: You'll find this tunnel of trees by walking through the meadow. This peaceful path leads to trails in our 75-acre Natural Area. What are things that plants need to survive? Do you think the plants in this area get those things?
Floral Walk: This pathway begins at the Oak Sculpture and leads to the Rose Garden. There are non-paved forest paths that connect you to another part of the Floral Walk. Can you find all the colors of the rainbow?	Water Conservation Garden: This garden is terraced, has good views of Salt Lake City, and features plants that do well with very little water. Which plants would you want to put in your own water conservation garden? Why? Choose a plant to observe. What features of the plant do you think help it survive with little water?
